The music composed by SIX is based on free improvisation—combining all sorts of tones ranging from strings and chords to wind instruments, vocals and analog synthesizers. Of great importance for the music's energetic outcome and acoustic perception is the architectural character of every venue. The interaction and influence of tones, sounds, scratches—but also silence—always depend on how dynamically the space in which they are being produced is structured. SIX is an extraordinary listening experience in which boundaries between instruments, different techniques and audience disappear.

Strotter Inst. by Christoph Hess



The Swiss musician, artist, architect and turntablist **Christoph Hess** started the project **Strotter Inst.** in 1998. The manipulation of five old Lenco turntables without using any additional records or sounds is what fascinates him most. Clicks, scrapes, drones and many broken beats are the result of Hess' performances which, preferably, take place in the middle of the audience. Strotter Inst. is set up individually, according to each room's conditions. Depending on the latter factor and on the uncertain and changing behavior of the machines, each live

appearance becomes an acoustic original.

Karl Saurer (1943) from Einsiedeln, Switzerland, studied film, literature and psychology in Zurich and Germany. He taught in the drama department of the German Film and Televison Academy in Berlin and was the director of the academy from 1980-84. He has lectured at different film schools in Switzerland and is currently on the faculty of the University of Fribourg. Saurer has an impressive list of fiction and documentary films to his credit, both as screenwriter and director.



Raja's Journey (2007) is the mysterious story of Raja, the Indian elephant that travelled in 1550 from the forests of Kerala via Lisbon (Portugal) to Vienna. The film retraces Raja's journey together with Gandhi activist P.V. Rajagopal, who makes surprising discoveries and provoking juxtapositions. As we follow along the path of Raja, we see the elephant imprisoned, in ceremonies, and captured to become a status symbol for a European ruler. Raja's Journey presents us with stunningly beautiful pictures, but is also a story of misappropriation that continues today. It will be screened at the 28th St. Paul Minneapolis International Film Festival on April 28, at the University of Wisconsin at Madison on April 30 and at the Chicago Cultural Center on May 20 (for detailed information on locations and screenings, see Calendar).

Steinauer Nebraska, an earlier film of Karl Saurer, is a story of migration, settlement and banishment and recounts the rise and fall of the three Swiss brothers who in the mid 1850s gave their family name "Steinauer" to their new home in Nebraska. The film reveals the complexities of the historical process of homesteading and its corollary home-losing and contrasts the new settlers with the original inhabitants. Steinauer Nebraska is a reminder that in spite of the large land holdings not all new settlers managed to eke out a living and that in the end Mother Earth reclaimed the prairie grass. It will be screened at the Swiss Center of North America in New Glarus, WI, on May 1, at Turner Hall Monroe on May 2 and at the Chicago Cultural Center on May 17 (for detailed information on locations and screenings, see Calendar).

The Woman with the 5 Elephants is a film about Swetlana Geier, who is considered the greatest translator of Russian literature into German. Her new translations of Dostoyevsky's five great novels – known as the "five elephants"—are her life's work and literary milestones. Jendreyko's film interweaves Swetlana Geier's live journey from Ukraine to Germany with her literary work and traces the secrets of this inexhaustible mediator of language (www.5elefanten.ch).

Home by Ursula Meier Breath Made Visible by Ruedi Gerber

Filmmaker **Ursula Meier's** human comedy *Home* (2008) was awarded the Swiss Film Prize 2009 for Best Fiction, Best Script, and Best Supporting Actor. Since then, Home has garnered numerous additional awards and has been shown internationally with much success. Home is a film about how life can change due to apparently ordinary circumstances. When a busy highway opened next to their somewhat isolated home, the peaceful family life of Marthe (Isabelle Huppert), Michel (Olivier Gourmet) and their three children is threatened. Refusing to move, they find innovative ways to adapt to their new environment and continue their happy-go-lucky routine despite the daily stress of hundreds of noisy cars speeding past their home. Unwittingly, their domestic routine becomes somewhat of a peep show. While Michel has enough, Marthe is determined to cling to their home, no matter what. Breath Made Visible (2009) by Swiss Filmmaker **Ruedi Gerber** captures the fascinating work and life of dancer-choreographer and activist Anna Halprin. It is a most extraordinary documentary film which invites the audience into the world of a dancer with great sensitivity and intelligence. The Gene Siskel Film Center will screen Breath Made Visible from April 16 to 22 (for details, see Calendar and www.siskelfilmcenter.org).





For seven decades Halprin (*1920), a pioneer of dance, has searched for answers to the question: How can we closely link life and dance? In Breath Made Visible, she recalls her childhood in Winnetka (Illinois), her training with Margaret H'Doubler, her film performances with James Broughton. The viewer witnesses the healing power of dance, as Halperin works with cancer patients, AIDS patients and the elderly. Halprin has influenced experimental postmodern dance in a decisive way and continues to amaze us with her solo performances. Breath Made Visible traces the incredible journey of Halprin and the rise of dance as art and as a form of enjoying life (www.breathmadevisible.com).




Mercury House One (Architecture and Vision)

Swiss architect and artist Florian Graf will be presenting an intervention project at Art Chicago 2010 from April 30 to May 3. Graf's huge nomadic sculptures, which will be wandering through the art fair as "Lost Waltzing Walls," can be observed and 'tracked down' throughout the art show at the Merchandise Mart. Graf is interested in the psychological and emotional relationship of human beings with their environment in contemporary Western society and explores the different ways the architectural surrounding mentally and physically influences the spectator. He mainly works with installation, photomontage, video and drawings. For Art Chicago 2010, Graf will be integrating people both into his art work and the fair's environment, as his wandering sculptures are physically moved by confined humans. Individually, the latter feel socially detached. Eventually, though, linking with their local context, they start creating new situations which can both be seen and felt throughout the entire exhibition.

Porret's artistic credo can be described as follows: "Achieving a sense of rightness even in the most uncertain circumstances."
