Martin R. Dean was born in Menziken (Canton Aargau) to a father with Indian roots from Trinidad and Tobago and a Swiss mother. He spent his first years in Trinidad then attended school in Switzerland. After travelling the world, Dean completed his studies in German, ethnology and philosophy at the University of Basel in 1986. Since that time he has worked as an award winning author, journalist and essayist in Basel. His books include "Meine Väter" (My Fathers), "Monsieur Fume oder das Glück der Vergesslichkeit" (Mister Fume or the Bliss of Absentmindedness), and "Die Ballade von Billie und Joe" (The Ballad of Billie and Joe). He is the recipient of several literary prizes such as the Kunstpreis Berlin in 1999 and the Schiller Prize of the Swiss Schiller Foundation in 2003. Dean continues to travel the world as a guest lecturer, poet-in-residence, translator and author. He will read his shortstory "Moi."

**Daniel Zahno** makes his home in Basel. He is known for his light, humorous and entertaining work, which also touches subtly on deep existential

issues. His books "Doktor Turban" (Doctor Turban a collection of short stories) and "Im Hundumdrehen" (In the Twinkling of an Eye—a dog story told in 77 ways) have received numerous awards, including the Clemens-Brentano-Prize of the City of Heidelberg. Zahno was a fellow at the International Writers Colony Ledig House, New York, and the Istituto Svizzero in Venice. He is a member of the programming commission for the Swiss Literature Days of Solothurn (Solothurner Literaturtage), arguably one of the most important events in German literature. Last year Zahno had the honor of presenting the Nobel Prize winner John Coetzee there. He will read "Carlotti," a short story.

The anthology Young Swiss Authors has been put together by Professor Romey Sabalius, an expert in contemporary Swiss literature, at San José State University, and Professor Michael Wutz at Weber State University at Provo, Utah. It includes texts by 23 contemporary Swiss writers in the German original and in English translation. It has been published as a special edition by the bilingual journal *Dimension2* (http://hometown.aol.com/germanlit/dimension2.html). The production of this anthology was supported in part by Pro Helvetia, Swiss Arts Council, and Migros, Zurich, Switzerland.

### **News from Lucerne**

The current resident of the Lucerne Artist Studio, Mart Meyer, will soon leave Chicago, as his residency here comes to an end. He will be followed by composer **Marie-Cécile Reber**, who is scheduled to arrive in early February. She holds a graduate degree in music theory and piano, received training in recording and audio engineering, and pursued studies in electronic music and composition. Besides building up her own music studio in Lucerne, Switzerland, Reber has taught music at different schools in the Lucerne area and worked on numerous commissions for compositions, experimental videos, theatre and sound installations. Since 1994 she has performed her own compositions based on processed analog sounds and has played concerts of improvised and composed music with fellow musicians form Lucerne. These include former residents at the Lucerne Artist Studio Thomas Mejer and Fredy Studer. Reber will explore the vast musical landscapes in Chicago and plans to create a "quiet project in a loud city."

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# Chicago Celebrates the Festival de la Francophonie



This year's Festival de la Francophonie is held from March 10 through March 25, 2007. It will again showcase the participating countries, including Switzerland, through cultural events such as films, concerts and storytelling. Most events are held at Alliance Française in Chicago (for details and additional venues, see calendar or visit www.afchicago.org). The festival will open with the "soirée commune" on Saturday, March 10, 2007, from 6:00 to 10:00 pm, with music, a raffle and the various country kiosques with samples of the local cuisines of the Francophonie countries. Switzerland will offer the traditional Raclette and Swiss white wine. Admission to the soirée commune is \$12 per person.

On Sunday, March 18, 2007 at 6:30 pm, Switzerland will present the **Ensemble Lucidarium** with the concert *"De tout mon couer je t'exalteray"* at **Holy Name Cathedral** in Chicago (entrance at North State Street and Superior).

The Ensemble Lucidarium is an international group of musicians specialized in medieval and Renaissance music. Each of their programs is the fruit of intensive research and preparation. Their performances offer a vivacious combination of voices and instruments and give evidence of solid knowledge of musical style and historical background. Their unique approach has opened up new perspectives in historical performance and brought critical acclaim to the Ensemble.

The Swiss contributions to the Semaine de la Francophonie have been made possible in part by the Swiss Benevolent Society of Chicago, the Swiss Club of Chicago, Holy Name Cathedral, Chicago, the Service de la Francophonie of the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs, Berne, Switzerland, and the Consulate General of Switzerland.

The Ensemble Lucidarium will also perform at **Fermilab** at Batavia, IL, on Saturday, March 17, at 8:00 pm (see calendar). Their Batavia concert will feature *"La Istoria de Purim,"* Jewish music and poetry from the Italian Renaissance. *"La Istoria de Purim,"* which recounts the story of Queen Esther, was awarded first prize in 2004 by the European Association for Jewish Culture.

## New Dürrenmatt Translation, New Publications of Swiss Abroad and Swiss Writers on a United States Tour in Spring



On November 2, 2006, the University of Chicago Press and the Goethe Institut Chicago introduced the new translation of Selected Works by Swiss writer Friedrich Dürrenmatt (1921-90), one of the most important literary figures of the second half of the twentieth century. With this translation, which was supported in part by Pro Helvetia, Swiss Arts Council, Dürrenmatt's writing becomes widely available to the English speaking world. Translator Joel Agee and author of the introduction Kenneth J. Northcott have brought their scholarly expertise to the English publication of the Selected Works. It was most fascinating to listen to them as they talked about their work on the translation at the introduction at the Goethe Institut Chicago. Minnesota resident **Ruth Elisabeth Schoch Knutson** published her life story in *On the Other Side of the Ocean* in the fall 2006 (Trafford Publishing; ISBN: 1-4120-9206-x, www.trafford.com). She was born and raised in Dornach (Canton Solothurn, Switzerland) and has lived in the United States for over 40 years. In her book, Schoch looks back to her small Swiss village and describes the vagaries of life in her close-knit multi-generational family during the 1940s and 1950s.
