New Consul General in Chicago

Mr. Martin Bienz arrived in Chicago at the beginning of January 2011 to start his term of office as Consul General of Switzerland responsible for 12 States in the Midwest. Mr. Bienz succeeds Mr. Giambattista Mondada who finished his term as Consul General in Chicago in late December 2010 and began his retirement after 41 years of service to the Swiss government. Before Mr. Mondada returned to Switzerland, the Consulate General had the chance to thank him and bid him farewell at a reception in November 2010.

Mr. Bienz' last posting was in Karachi, Pakistan, where he served as Consul General from 2006 to 2010. He was born and raised in Lostorf, in the canton of Solothurn. After his studies and professional activities in the banking sector, he joined the Federal Department of Foreign Affairs in

1981. He was subsequently assigned to the Swiss Consular and Diplomatic Missions in Marseille, Addis Ababa and Bogotá. In 1990, he was appointed as Head of Chancery at the Consulate General of Switzerland in Osaka. Four years later, he transferred to the Embassy of Switzerland in Ottawa to serve in the same capacity. From 2000 to 2003, he was the Head of Section for Eastern Europe and Latin America at the Federal Office for Refugees in Berne, Switzerland. In 2003, before taking up his post as Consul General in Karachi, he served as Counselor and Deputy Head of Mission at the Embassy of Switzerland in Manila.

Mr. Bienz is married to Dessiree Bienz and has one son. Chicago was on their "wish list" and both Mr. and Mrs. Bienz are happy to be here and are looking forward to their new assignment.

Swiss writer **Dorothee Elmiger** will read from **Einladung an die Waghalsigen** at the Literaturlenz 2011 at the Goethe Institut Chicago on Wednesday, February 16, 2011, at 6:00 p.m. The Literaturlenz is the traditional annual literary event in Chicago which features emergent authors from Switzerland, Germany and Austria. It is organized by the Consulates General of Austria and Switzerland and the Goethe Institut Chicago. The readings will be in German, with simultaneous projection of the English translation. Before coming to Chicago, Elmiger will participate in the *Festival Neue Literatur* in New York. She and her fellow writers at the Literaturlenz will also visit the University of Wisconsin in Madison (February 15), the University of Illinois in Chicago (February 17) and the University of Illinois in Urbana (February 18) for readings and workshops with German students and faculty.

Elmiger (born in 1985) grew up in Appenzell. She studied at the Swiss Institute of Literature in Biel/Bienne and spent one semester at the German Institute of Literature in Leipzig. Since 2009, she has made her home in Berlin where she writes and studies political science at the Freie Universität Berlin.

Einladung an die Waghalsigen is Elmiger's first novel. Published in 2010 by DuMont Buchverlag in Cologne, it is currently being translated into English (*Invitation to the Daredevils*). Elmiger is a recent shooting star in the German literary world. For her novel, she was awarded the *Kelag Prize* at the prestigious *Ingeborg Bachmann Festival 2010* and the *Aspekte Literature Prize 2010 for Best German Debut Prose*.

The **Soirée Suisse** (Swiss Evening) on Thursday, **March 10, 2011, at 6:30 p.m.** will feature the Swiss film "**Déchaînées**" (2009) by Raymond Vouillamoz. Déchaînées will be screened in French with English/German subtitles. Following the film screening, an audience discussion will be conducted by **Hank Sartin**, Film Editor, TimeOut Chicago. A small wine and cheese reception will be offered prior to the screening.

In Déchaînées, Lucy, a 19-year old law student and intern at a Swiss television network in Geneva, comes across her double in archival footage about the Women's Liberation Movement in the 70's. Her family's reluctance to talk about this time convinces Lucy that a secret lurks behind this silence and the woman, named Genevieve, she saw on the archival film material. She sets out to find her and discovers that she was not only a member of Lucy's family but also a notorious feminist and abortion activist. As Lucy unfolds the family plot and her family begins to implode, she has to face her own secret... (also see www.swissfilms.ch).

This film has won multiple awards—among others *Best Swiss TV Film 2009*—and succeeds in combining political history with moving destinies of women and families of different generations while being peppered with sparkling dialogues.

Las Vegas Studio: Images from the Archives of Robert Venturi and Denise Scott Brown

Las Vegas Studio: Images from the Archives of Robert Venturi and Denise Scott Brown will be on view at the Graham Foundation in Chicago until February 19, 2011. The exhibition was curated by Hilar Stadler, Swiss art historian, who currently is the director of the Museum im Bellpark, Kriens (near Lucerne), and by Martino Stierli, Swiss art historian and postdoctoral fellow at the University of Basel. Stadler and Stierli collaborated with Swiss

artist **Peter Fischli**, internationally renowned as Fischli/Weiss with fellow Swiss artist David Weiss.

In 1968, American architects Robert Venturi, Denise Scott Brown, and Steven Izenour, together with students from Yale University, embarked on a groundbreaking investigation of the Las Vegas strip. Their findings, published in the 1972 book Learning from Las Vegas, are legendary, extending the categories of the ordinary, the ugly, and the social into architecture. Offering great insight into the creation of this pioneering publication, Las Vegas Studio presents original research materials from the archives of Venturi, Scott Brown and Associates, Inc., including over 80 photographs and a selection of films that were crucial aspects of their architectural study.

The film traces the journey which the German ethnologist and naturalist Prince Maximilian zu Wied undertook between 1832 and 1834 into the vast prairies of North America and which was documented by the young Swiss artist Karl Bodmer. Zu Wied and Bodmer set out to explore



the "New World" and discover Native American culture. To this date, the images of their journey have been amongst the most important and original testimony of Native Americans of North America.

Bodmer's Journey has been awarded *Best Art/Experimental Feature Film 2010* at the Southern Appalachian International Film Festival in Nashville as well as *Best Documentary 2010* at the New York City International Film Festival. At the 2010. Los Angeles Cinema Festival of Hollywood, it earned the *Merit Award 2010*.

Mai-Thu Perret: An Ideal for Living. Solo Exhibition at UMMA

Mai-Thu Perret: An Ideal for Living opened at the University of Michigan Museum of Art (UMMA) at Ann Arbor on December 16, 2010, and will run to March 12, 2011. This solo exhibition was curated by Jacob Proctor, UMMA Associate Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art, and is the most comprehensive overview of Perret's works to date in the United States, featuring brand-new works and works never before shown in this country.

Perret's multidisciplinary practice fuses feminist politics with classic modernist abstraction and utopian dreams. Her installations synthesize a range of media and genres, such as literature, craft and design. Much of her work arises from the *Crystal Frontier*, the fictional narrative she began to write in 1999 about a group of women who live

in the utopian commune called New Ponderosa. With her installations and objects Perret presents the hypothetical products of the New Ponderosa residents.

Perret's work is internationally known and has been shown at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, Kunst Halle St. Gallen (Switzerland), the Bonnefanten Museum at Maastricht (the Netherlands), the Renaissance Society of Chicago and Centre d'Art Contemporain in Geneva. 
